When vacuuming, I have had several incidents in which the cord had gotten stuck in the corners of cubicles and such, which potentially could cause an accident. I've learned to stop and reel the cord in every time I need to go around a corner. It takes a minute more, but saves on a lot of frustration and, I believe, makes the job a bit safer.

Stairwell Cleaning and Safety

Cleaning the stairs is an important part of the job. The stairs are a public area and, thus, highly visible to the customer. We need to clean the handrails, dust all edges and trim, and vacuum or mop the treads. Cleaning a stairwell can present hazards if you are not careful. Keep the following tips in mind when cleaning the stairs:

- Stairwells should always be free and clear of obstruction. Never leave tools or equipment (not even a spray bottle) on stairs, as others using the stairs would not expect something to be on the stairs and could trip and fall.
- When vacuuming the stairs, start at the bottom of the stairs and work your way up. When
 mopping, start at the top and work your way down.
- Use handrails and walk (don't run) when going up or down stairs.
- Minimize distractions. Be alert and aware of your surroundings.
 - Always know where the last step is, so you don't fall.
 - ALWAYS put up a <u>"Caution: Wet Floor"</u> sign when mopping.

Emergency Preparedness

FIRES IN THE WORKPLACE

There is always a risk of fire in the workplace, no matter what the time of year. As an ESS employee you should be familiar with the general safety rules, helping us prevent fires.

Good housekeeping, and routine equipment maintenance are important preventative measures. Additionally, you should be careful to keep flammable liquids in their proper closed containers, and away from ignition sources.

In case of a fire, you should familiarize yourself with all the evacuation routes from your building. If you are ever at work and see a fire or the alarm sounds, call 9-1-1 and evacuate immediately.

DO NOT attempt to put the fire out yourself. You need to wait until the fire department has cleared the building before re-entering.

Severe Weather Preparedness Tips: Spring Weather

Severe Thunderstorm Safety

When you hear the words "severe thunderstorm" in the forecast, be ready for more than just heavy rain and lightning.



Tornadoes and Severe Thunderstorms

According to the National Weather Service, Illinois is ranked 6th in the U.S. for the most tornadoes and has more than 850 reports of wind damage and large hail, on average, every year from severe thunderstorms.

A "WATCH" means severe weather is possible. A "WARNING" will be accompanied by sirens in case of a tornado. This means severe weather has been sighted, and you should take shelter immediately.

Find an underground area, such as a basement or storm cellar. If not available, find a small interior room or hallway on the lowest floor possible. Stay in the center of the room, and avoid corners because they attract debris.

AVOID auditoriums, cafeterias and gymnasiums that have flat, wide-span roofs.

AFTER, take a look around and inspect for damage to the building or property. Check in with your supervisor following any weather event that requires you to take shelter.

OTHER HAZARDS

Other situations that could pose a potential hazard are human blood or bodily fluids and spilled chemicals. To clean up human blood or bodily fluids, contact your supervisor and Do NOT attempt to clean up these materials without appropriate personal protective equipment.

For hazardous chemical spills, consult the Material Safety Data Sheet.
